## **GROANING IN OUR MORTAL BODY**

In our lesson text, Paul mentioned twice "Groaning in Mortal Body" (2 Cor.5:2, 4).

- "For indeed in the tent-house, we groan." (2 Cor.5:1-3)
- "For indeed while we are in the tent, we groan." (2 Cor.5:4)

#### We will study five aspects of Groaning in Mortal Body.

#### 1. Six ways "groaning in the mortal body" reflects that our earthy body is inferior to our resurrection body.

 $1^{st}$  – Our mortal body is "made with hands", meaning it is earthy and temporal as compared to the resurrection body which is eternal and heavenly (2 Cor.5:1).

 $2^{nd}$  – Our resurrection body is a "building from God", "not made with hands, and eternal in the heavens." (2 Cor.5:1).

 $3^{rd}$  – Our mortal body is compared to a temporary housing. It is the believer's temporal house that is torn down by physical death (2 Cor.5:1).

4<sup>th</sup> - In our mortal body, we groan and are burdened, longing to be clothed with our eternal dwelling (our resurrection body) from heaven" (2 Cor.5:2).

5<sup>th</sup>- In our resurrection body, we "shall not be found naked and unclothed" (2 Cor.5:3-4).

6<sup>th</sup> - In resurrection body, "the mortal will be swallowed up by life eternal." (2 Cor.5:4; 1 Cor.15:50-58).

#### 2. Paul mentioned GROANING (stenazo) [sorrow and grief] twice, referring to our mortal body (2 Cor.5:2, 4).

It is interesting that Paul used two emphatic conjunctions with "groaning" for doctrinal emphasis:

- The terms "for" and "indeed" (gar and kai) explaining further by giving more detailed information than in (2 Cor.5:1) (2 Cor.5:2-10).
- Paul used them with **groaning** in (2 Cor.5:2) and again in (2 Cor.5:4) and added **burden** (bareo/ (<u>Rev.21:4</u>) giving additional information to (2 Cor.5:1-3).

#### 3. Paul used three different forms of the Greek word for <u>clothed (enduo)</u> to make different doctrinal points.

(2 Cor.5:2) "We groan longing to be <u>clothed</u> (**ep**enduomai) without dwelling from heaven." **Ependuo** - "to be clothed upon (epi/ upon)." The best example would be the Rapture

(1 Cor.15:50-58) "We will not all asleep, <u>but we will all be changed</u>." (1 Cor.15:51-54) (allasso) [all receive resurrection body].

(2 Cor.**5:3)** <u>Enduo</u> (clothed/ a.m.ptc nplm/ to put on) - Special phrase - "In as much as (ei/ ge/ kai) [as is sure to be the case]. We have <u>put it on</u> (resurrection body), **shall not be found naked**."

(2 Cor.**5:4)** - <u>**Ekduo** (unclothed</u> (a.p.infin) [undressed] - "<u>We do not want</u> (ouk theolo/ p.a.ind.1pl) to be <u>unclothed</u>, but to be <u>clothed (ependuo</u>/ a.p.infin)." (2 Cor.5: 2)

# 4. Paul's longing was to be clothed with the resurrection body so as not to be unclothed, undressed, or naked (gumnos) (2 Cor.5:3) [without either body].

Paul is explaining, <u>as much as he is permitted to</u>, about the state of the soul between physical death and receiving one's resurrection body (2 Cor.12:1-10). It is the state of being undressed, unclothed, or naked regarding the body (house for the soul) (Gen.2:7) [man] (Gen.2:11) and [woman] (Gen.3:16) [all mankind].

### 5. We will close with these <u>five truths</u> that we can know for certain of:

1<sup>st</sup> "Therefore, being always of good courage, and knowing that <u>while we are at home in the body, we are absent</u> from the Lord - for we walk by faith, not by sight - we are of good courage, I say, <u>and prefer to be absent</u> from the body and to be at home with the Lord." (2 Cor.5:6-8)

2<sup>nd</sup> "But some have fallen asleep" (1 Cor.15:6b; Acts 7:60). "Behold, I tell you a mystery; we will not all sleep, but we will all be changed." (1 Cor.15:51/ Rapture)

**3<sup>rd</sup>** "But I am hard-pressed from **both directions**, having the **desire to depart and be with Christ**, for that is **very much better**." (Phil.1:23/1:20-25) "We groan longing (epipotheo/ p.a.ptc.nplm) to be clothed with our dwelling from heaven." (2 Cor.5:2)

4<sup>th</sup> "Then those also who have **fallen asleep in Christ** have perished" (1 Cor.15:18) [a false doctrine] ("if no resurrection"). "But we do not want you to be uninformed, brethren, about those who are **asleep**, so that you will not **grieve as do the rest who have** <u>no hope</u>." (1 Thess.4:13) (1 Thess. 4:13-18) (unbelievers).

5<sup>th</sup> Spiritual comfort comes to the spiritually growing believer from the doctrine of the Rapture at the death of the beloved in Christ (1 Cor.15:50-58; 1 Thess.4:13-18). "Therefore <u>comfort (parakaleo/ p.a.impv.2pl</u>) one another with these words." (1 Thess.4:18) (2 Cor.1:3-11)

"To be absent from the mortal body and present with Lord is VERY MUCH BETTER."
